東京とメルボルンの電車文化 The Train Culture of Tokyo and Melbourne

This speech compares the train cultures of Tokyo and Melbourne, focusing on key differences. Tokyo's trains are infamous for being packed during rush hour, with workers and students filling every inch. Despite the congestion, the trains are remarkably punctual, and staff issue delay certificates for delays over five minutes, even deeply apologising for minor ones. Navigating Tokyo's train maps can be complex due to the complex network of lines. In contrast, Melbourne's trains are less crowded and more laid-back. The simpler train maps and longer distances between stations make commuting easier. While Melbourne has train rules, they aren't as strictly followed, and talking on trains is generally accepted. The speech also compares Flinders Street Station in Melbourne with Shinjuku Station in Tokyo, highlighting that Shinjuku handles about 38 times more passengers daily. The presentation concludes with my opinion of which is the best and an overall summary of the speech.
